LIKE the war itself, Ellesmere Port's VE celebrations on Tuesday got off to a comparatively slow start but rose in a crescendo of combined effort to a triumphant conclusion.

Rather than hilarious merry-making, however, there was a dignified restraint which at once fittingly marked a glorious victory and held respect for those who gave their all to bring it about yet did not return to rejoice.

> The victory atmosphere was "unsettled" on Monday, as unconfirmed reports of Germany's unconditional surrender constituted the main topic of conversation. The more optimistic chose to believe German broadcasts for at least once, while the more cautious hoped for the truth of these reports but awaited the official announcement which seemed an unconsciable time incoming.

But it was clear that after more than five long years the end could not long be delayed, so that that special spirit of preparation born of war-time again asserted itself and there was a rush on the food shops. By 5 o'clock all the bread had been bought up, although the bakers intended to see, and carried it out, that there should be no shortage over the two days' holiday.

Expectancy, too, led to the commencement of street decorations, a pleasurable task in which many more people hurriedly joined when it was announced that Tuesday would be observed as VE Day. Whitby
